NATIONAL HAVE A COKE DAY Friday, May 8th



Each year on May 8th, millions of people across the country celebrate National Have a Coke Day. Coca-Cola, often referred to as Coke, is a carbonated soft drink produced by The Coca-Cola Company.

Coke is a registered trademark of the Coca-Cola Company in the United States since March 27, 1944. As of 2013, Coke distributes products in over 200 countries around the world as consumers down more than 1.8 million company beverage servings each day.

While the holiday focuses on the bubbly, carbonated beverage, the drink and its associated memorabilia inspires collectors across generations. From sign art to vintage soda fountain glassware, collectors love to replicate classic flavors with authentic style.

NATIONAL HAVE A COKE DAY HISTORY

In the late 19th century, John Pemberton invented Coca-Cola, at Pemberton's Eagle Drug and Chemical House in Columbus, Georgia. He intended to patent the beverage as medicine. However, Asa Griggs Candler bought out the business. Candler's marketing tactics led Coke to its dominance of the world soft-drink market throughout the 20th century.

Coco-Cola Timeline:

1891 – Bottling of Coco-Cola begins for the first time at the Biedenharn Candy Company in Vicksburg, Mississippi.

1894 – The first outdoor wall advertisement promoting the Coca-Cola drink was painted in Cartersville, Georgia

1914 – Atlanta's Fleeman's Pharmacy opens its doors.

The longest-running commercial Coca-Cola soda fountain anywhere became a historic landmark of Atlanta and Coca-Cola. The pharmacy closed its doors in 1995 after 81 years. 1944 – The Coca-Cola Company manufactures its one-billionth gallon of Coca-Cola syrup on July 12th.

1955 – The company produces its first cans of Coke.

Frequently Asked Questions about Remote Learning Ansley Public Schools

Has Prom been cancelled?

Prom has been postponed. We intend to have Prom this summer once health restrictions are lessened. If, however, health restrictions make it impossible to have a prom this summer, we will discuss other alternatives with the prom sponsors and the junior class.

How will Graduation be handled?

Graduation has been postponed until June 27th at 11:00. If allowed, we will have a traditional graduation ceremony on that day. If not, we will have a socially distanced “drive-in” style graduation. If that type of gathering is not allowed, we will have a virtual ceremony for our Seniors.

Have end-of-the-year award ceremonies been canceled?

No. Because we still want to recognize our students for their successes, we will be having virtual awards ceremonies. We will have a 7-12th grade ceremony (which will include 8th Grade Promotion), and an Elementary ceremony (which will include 6th Grade Promotion). We will keep you informed of the details.

How will Quarter 4 grades be handled?

School districts have been given several options for handling grades during this time of remote learning. After much consideration, we have come up with a grading plan that we think best suits our students and teachers. We understand that the sudden shift to remote learning has (and will continue to have) a significant impact on the way our teachers teach and the way our students learn. In order to account for this, grades for Quarter 4 will be handled in the following ways:

- All teachers will exercise flexible lesson planning and grading practices.
- PK-K teachers will continue to assess students using standards-based grading.

. Grade 1-12 teachers will continue assessing student work using points or percentages. To account for the sudden change in teaching and learning, each student’s quarter grade will be increased by a certain percentage at the end

of the quarter (adjusted student grades will go no higher than 100%). This new Quarter 4 grade will be averaged with the Quarter 3 grade to determine a Semester 2 grade

Why can’t we just end the school year now?

Our school district is following the directive of the Commissioner of Education that all schools must educate their students remotely for the rest of the school year. While there is no doubt that this shift in education has been difficult for students, teachers, and parents, our ultimate goal is that our students keep learning and keep moving forward as much as possible

How will students get “caught up” to where they need to be next year?

Obviously, this will be a challenge for our students and our teachers. It is important to remember, however, that our school is not alone in this; schools nationwide will be facing the same dilemma. Unfortunately, this is not something that will be “fixed” quickly but rather will take time to make up for the lost hours in the classroom. With that being said, these are some of our plans for getting our students back on track:

- Elementary teachers will assess students at the beginning of the year using MAP and Acadience testing—the data from these assessments will be helpful in determining students’ areas of strength and weakness. Grade-level teachers will also collaborate with each other to determine which standards have been met and which ones still need to be taught. Teachers will make adjustments to the curriculum as needed.

At the high school level, we are fortunate that several of our core teachers teach the same students for several years in a row. With data from MAP testing and other assessments, teachers will be able to determine what concepts and standards need to be taught and/or re-taught. Teachers will make adjustments to the curriculum as needed.

Will the 11th graders still get a chance to take the ACT?

The NDE and ACT are working together to come up with some options for 11th grade students who want to take the ACT but were unable to due to school closure. Once the details are worked out, we will inform 11th grade students and parents.

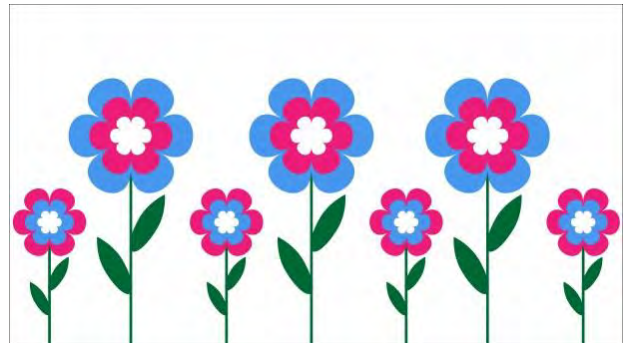

Baked Cinnamon Rolls

Prep Time: 1 Hours

Cook Time: 20 Minutes

Serves: 8 - 12 people

Ingredients

1/2 Ounce (2 Packets) Active Dry Yeast
1/3 Cup Plus 1 Tsp Cane Sugar, Divided
1 Cup Warm Water (110°-115°F)
5 Cup All-Purpose Flour, Plus More as Needed
2 Teaspoon Salt
1 Cup Warm Milk (110°-115°F)
1 Large Eggs
1/2 Cup Butter, Softened
1 Cup Brown Sugar
2 Tablespoon Cinnamon
4 Ounce Cream Cheese, Room Temperature
1/2 Cup Butter, Room Temperature
2 Cup Powdered Sugar
1/2 Teaspoon Vanilla
1 Teaspoon Milk
Pinch Salt



Steps

1. Place the yeast, 1 tsp of sugar, and the warm water in a mixing bowl or the base of a stand mixer. Stir to combine. Allow the yeast to proof for 5 minutes, it should start to bubble a bit, showing that the yeast is indeed alive.
2. Sprinkle the flour, salt and remaining 1/3 cup sugar over the yeast mixture. Using a dough hook or wooden spoon, stir for 30 seconds. Pour in the warm milk and egg.
3. Knead again on the medium-low setting, or on a floured work surface by hand until the dough is very soft, adding up to one more cup of flour so the dough is soft and smooth and has lost its sticky quality.
4. Coat the bowl with a small film of oil and place the dough in the bowl, turning to coat the dough evenly with oil. Cover the bowl with a clean cloth, place in a warm spot in the kitchen and allow to proof, about 45 minutes. The dough will have almost doubled in size.
5. In a small bowl combine the softened butter, sugar, and cinnamon.

6. Punch down the dough and roll out into a rectangle on a floured work surface.
7. Spread the cinnamon butter mixture over the top of the dough and roll up into a log.
8. Cut the dough into rolls about 2" thick. Transfer rolls to a buttered baking dish or cast iron and lightly cover with a kitchen towel. Let the rolls rise again until doubled in size.
9. When ready to cook, set the temperature to 325°F and preheat, lid closed for 15 minutes.
10. Place the baking dish or cast iron directly on the grill grate and bake the rolls until lightly browned, about 20 minutes.
11. For the Icing: place cream cheese and butter in the bowl of a stand mixer fitted with a paddle attachment. Mix together on medium speed until combined. Reduce the speed to low and add in the powdered sugar slowly. Add vanilla, a pinch of salt and milk and mix to combine.
12. Remove the rolls from the grill and spread icing on top while the rolls are still warm. Enjoy!
